RMT has launched a highly successful campaign to keep South Eastern Trains in the public sector.

Nearly 100 MPs have signed Early Day Motion 254, which demands that the re-privatisation of SET is halted and that this important franchise is kept under the control of the Strategic Rail Authority rather than handed to yet another profit-hungry privateer.

We see this as a first step to creating a reintegrated and publicly owned railway.

Under public management South Eastern Trains has shown a dramatic improvement in the punctuality of the service.

Figures released by the SRA reveal that SET ran 74.6 per cent of its trains on time in the last quarter of 2003 – almost nine per cent better than the same period in 2002, when Connex was still running the franchise.

The company has also taken on more staff to get the trains moving again.

Even before the figures were published, more than 70 per cent of people agreed that train operations should be brought back home to the public sector.

It is clear from the local response to the RMT campaign that even more are con-

vinced now, and the campaign is growing daily.

The decision by Network Rail to bring rail maintenance back in-house in order to "ensure greater consistency of maintenance and deliver efficiency savings" has also been widely welcomed following years of chaos due to the privatisation in 1996.

This failure of the private sector to deliver makes the handing over of track maintenance to the same privateers on London Underground even more irrational.

The introduction of PPP on the Underground must be reversed and RMT will be fighting just as hard, with just as much public support, to reverse such a disastrous policy.

I welcome this opportunity, through *Railwatch*, to speak to others who are as concerned as we are about public transport. I believe that together we can bring about real change.
