

90mph freight on line

A 90mph intermodal freight service is to be introduced between London and Scotland via the West Coast main line.

English Welsh and Scottish Railway announced the move at the Rail Freight Group Scottish conference.

The upgrade from 75mph will allow more goods to be transferred from road to rail according to Graham Laycock, network strategy manager of EWS.

The 90mph service is also said to open up the potential for Irish parcels via Stranraer to be sent by rail instead of road.

Also in Scotland, W H Malcolm's rail freight terminal at Grangemouth has been so successful that the number of trains has been increased from four to 12 a week.

In England, Combined Transport Ltd introduced a daily freight shuttle in June between Manchester and Purfleet, Essex, for the short sea crossing to Rotterdam and Zeebrugge.

Work has also started on a £5million rail terminal for Jaguar's plant at Castle Bromwich, Birmingham. When it is finished

Switzerland is a pioneer in using the device and it is hoping to persuade other European railways to follow suit. It accuses other railways of dragging their feet in fitting the device and choosing to wait for a satellite-based system. "It will take far too long for this system to reach maturity," said expert Marcel Ott. "We are currently working with SBB Cargo to convince foreign rail operators of the benefits of our system and to encourage them not to hold back." In the past few months, Britain has seen a series of serious freight train derailments.

ished all Jaguar cars for export will go by rail.

Incoming components will also be rail-borne. The plant should cut 45 million lorry miles over 10 years, according to Railtrack. The project is being managed by Birse Construction which is

working on other rail-head distribution sites in Britain.

In Liverpool, a group of would-be rail freight customers have joined forces to sign a contract to buy wagons. The Liverpool Rail development group has been

impressed by trial trains to Felixstowe, Suffolk.

In Switzerland, SBB Cargo has launched a new swap body freight system called Domino which will complement the trainload and wagonload service SBB Cargo already offers to customers.
